Transfiguration: On this second Sunday of Lent the Gospel is on the Transfiguration of Jesus. Our Savior had talked to his disciples about the cross—not only His cross but taking up their cross as well and they must have been afraid. So Jesus does something beautiful. He takes Peter, James and John up a high mountain and is transfigured before them. This is a glimpse of heaven. It helps to know our des-



tination. Trials, tribulations, crosses, and even our Lenten observances are paths that are upon us. But if we know where we are going it makes it all worth it.

Witness to Hope: WE DID IT!!! We have surpassed our four million dollar goal. Thank you everyone for your generosity and sacrifice for our Church. There are some others that are still willing to contribute, so we will keep moving forward. We especially want to make come capital improvements outside, including work on the Outreach Center so we can still use all the help we can get. We still want to reach the 700-participant goal.

Quest: Recently I met with a staff member of Quest. This organization leads virtue-based sports camps during the summer. We are hoping to host volleyball, basketball and football camps. More details to follow.

Healing: This evening, March 12, I am talking about the two Sacraments of Healing, Anointing of the Sick and Reconciliation, to our RCIA group. I love these Sacraments! First Communion Interviews: This week Fr. Gary and I will be conducting First Communion interviews with our second graders. I always enjoy seeing the children's joyful anticipation in receiving Jesus in the Eucharist.

St. Patrick's Day: This Friday, March 17, is a lot of people's favorite day! I will be attending a 12:02 pm Mass

at St. Michael's in downtown Flint to celebrate the day. Sometimes we forget the story of St. Patrick. As a youth Patrick was carried off as a slave from Britain to northern Ireland, where he tended his master's pigs. After six years he escaped and returned to his family. But one night in a dream he had a vision that encouraged him to go back to Ireland. He did and established the Catholic Church in Ireland. In his twenty-nine years he transformed Ireland, replacing an ancient paganism with a vibrant Christian Church.

Did You Know...

Every year the parish of Holy Family baptizes youth and adults at the Easter Vigil?

Because we have "Elect" in our RCIA process, we will be using the readings from Liturgical Cycle Year A on the 3rd Sunday of Lent at the 12 pm Mass (Mar 19th), on the 4th Sunday of Lent at the 10 am Mass (Mar 26th), and on the 5th Sunday of Lent at the 12 pm Mass (Apr 2nd.) The Church has designated these to be the readings when the Elect, and in solidarity with them, all of us, participate in the "Scrutinies" on these particular Sundays.

To scrutinize means to look at closely, to see all the details. During Lent we are called to take careful note of our lives and how we live them in response to God's gracious love and mercy toward us. Thus, on the third Sunday of Lent, we hear the story of Living Water that only Christ can give. Only God the Son can provide the grace and redemption that provides us with life everlasting. In solidarity with the Elect, on the 3rd Sunday of Lent, let us acknowledge all of our graces and blessings that only come from God and call us to a full response of faith, just like the Samaritan Woman.

On the 4th Sunday of Lent, along with Elect, we acknowledge that we are blind to our own faults and failings. Just as the blind man is healed by Christ, only Christ can give us the sign needed to honestly look into our hearts and lives and see what must be changed in order to more freely follow Him.

On the 5th Sunday of Lent, we hear the story of the raising of Lazarus, Jesus' beloved friend, from the dead. The Elect have journeyed throughout the period of the Catechumenate and this time of Purification and Enlightenment, seeking the deepest possible relationship with Jesus.

Jesus wants to become our beloved; He wants all of us to be transformed to new life. In solidarity with the Elect, we seek our Beloved Jesus and pledge our deep desire to "turn away from sin and be faithful to the Gospel." We know that conversion/transformation can only take place when we die to our own willfulness and selfishness.

Bishop Earl Boyea, at the Rite of Election on March 4th, explained to the Catechumens that they have been called by God to be part of His Church they are responding to God's call, not a summons by a friend, a spouse or their own inclination. What does God seek in response to His call? Our hearts ... are you ready to turn another piece of your heart over to God this Lent?

- The "working poor" are people who spend 27 weeks or more in a year in the labor force either working or looking for work but whose incomes fall below the federal poverty level.
- Stagnation of wages at the bottom of the US wage distribution over the past several decades and continuing low rates of full-time work, especially in single-parent households, often leave families below the official poverty threshold.

Client Profile: Anne's Story

Anne is a hard working single mom. Anne works full time right in our own community. She is someone who may have helped you at one time or another. Anne is friendly and is a pleasant face for her employer. Anne is a mother of four children and two grandchildren. The whole family lives with her and depends on her sole income. "I do it on my own. I don't know how!" admits Anne.

Anne's oldest is 19 years old. She has a two-year-old toddler and a newborn baby born on Valentine's Day. The new mom is not yet working again. Anne's 16-year-old son is recently living with his dad. Anne has another daughter at 13 and a son 11 years old. The voungest daughter refuses to go to school because of bullies. Social Services are getting involved; however. Anne can't seem to convince her daughter that she needs to go. The youngest son has special needs with ADHD and has SSI entitlements. Anne feels that all of her children have some type of bipolar or behavior needs.

One would never know the daily challenges Anne deals with when seeing her at her job. She is always happy and positive. Connie at our Outreach Pantry can tell you that she is very anxious about her situation and the challenges to fill the needs of her family on her very limited income.

Anne's mother passed six years ago. Her mother kept her away from her father for safety reasons. Anne says her positive attitude and perseverance come from her mom.

The pantry has helped Anne for more than a decade. Anne will tell you that the Outreach Pantry has always been there for her. "I work for three straight weeks. On my week off, I look forward to coming to the Holy Family Pantry. I get a little food and friendly, encouraging conversation there. I don't know what I'd do without Connie. I wouldn't have a stove if it wasn't for her," said Anne. "Sometimes I just come to talk. One time I got a much needed coat for my youngest."

Anne has an older minivan. Outreach has helped her with a few minor service repairs in the past. The passenger door has to be opened from the outside and one of the rear doors and some of the windows don't open.

Anne is so grateful for the pantry. She recalls a month where her van broke down and she received a shut off notice from her electric company. The pantry helped her navigate the situation. She also is very thankful for the food gift box during the holidays. That box means so much during a time that is usually stressful.

Anne works hard and tries to do it all on her own. It's nice to know the pantry is there if things get too rough.

Partner Profile:

Although Fr. Michael J. McGivney of St. Mary's Church in New Haven CT started the Knights of Columbus in the U.S. in 1882, Fr. John Bush founded the K of C Council #6742 at Holy Family Church of Grand Blanc in 1975. Joe Dunn, the council's Financial Secretary, remembers that Fr. Bush nourished the organization by bringing in many men of the parish.

The K of C helps raise funds to aid the Outreach Pantry, sponsors five seminarians, church and school activities as well as funding ultrasound machines for women's health clinics. The machines are partially funded by the baby bottle drives to help encourage young mothers to keep their children full term. Also, during the school season, the Knights have pancake breakfasts every 2nd Sunday and spaghetti dinners every 3rd Wednesday for fundraisers. One hundred percent of funds received go to the charities.

The K of C does an Annual Tootsie Roll Drive. "The funds go to the state. The state keeps 20 percent and returns 80 percent to the councils," explains Dunn. The money goes to five main charities. The first charity is Special Olympics. The second is for an adult Boy Scouts chapter that consists of men of special needs in the area. Funds also go to Grand Blanc West Middle School for special education classes. Another charity is an assisted living location that houses young adults with special needs. The center teaches them how to live on their own. The last charity is called the Disability Network, which is run by Mike Zelley. The network teaches persons with physical challenges skills in order to support themselves. Some are taught secretarial and or



computer skills. The network also helps people find equipment, such as wheelchairs, if needed.

The Grand Knight has initiated a program called The Domestic Church. The Knights will be leading the rosary after the 10:00 Mass every fifth Sunday. This way parishioners can join right after the 10 a.m. Mass or just before the 12:00 p.m. Mass. The Knights want to help grow the presence of the rosary in our everyday faith, as well as show the Knight's presence to attract new members.

The Carpet Communion is another program. This is when the Knights come to church with their whole family on Sunday and fill the wings of the church in a display of devotion to the church. The 4th Degree Patriotic Order are the men you see with the plumed hats. They are a visible representation of the patriotic men of the council. "We want to be an integrated part of the church. We hope our presence will attract men to join and help them be stronger fathers," explains Dunn.

The Council has about 240 members. In the early years, Fr. Bush struggled to encourage attendance to the meetings. The Knights are enjoying a rebirth of young men. They still need young men who are energetic, as well as fluent in computers and technology to fuel its efforts.

Saints for the Week (March 12 - 18))

March 17: St. Patrick

Details of his life are uncertain. Current research places his dates of birth and death a little later than earlier accounts. Patrick may have been born in Dunbarton, Scotland, Cumberland, England, or in northern Wales. He called himself both a Roman and a Briton. At 16 he and a large number of his father's slaves and vassals were captured by Irish raiders and sold as slaves in Ireland. Forced to work as a shepherd, he suffered greatly from hunger and cold. After six years Patrick escaped, probably to France, and later returned to Britain at the age of 22. His captivity had meant spiritual conversion. He may have studied at Lerins, off the French coast; he spent years at Auxerre, France, and was consecrated bishop at the age of 43. His great desire was to proclaim the good news to the Irish.

March 18: St. Cyril of Jerusalem

Raised in Jerusalem and well-educated, especially in the Scriptures, he was ordained a priest by the bishop of Jerusalem and given the task during Lent of catechizing those preparing for Baptism and catechizing the newly baptized during the Easter season. His Catecheses remain valuable as examples of the ritual and theology of the Church in the mid-fourth century.
