

Msgr. Jerry's Journal

Happy Easter Still: As you know, the Easter Season is 50 days long concluding with Pentecost Sunday on June 3. The Octave of Easter concludes this Sunday. Easter reminds us that the Church begins with *witness*: lives changed by an encounter with the Risen Lord; men and women who then transform others by the power of their testimony and the authority of their example. In our Gospel Jesus ap-



pears to his disciples on the evening of Easter Sunday, his resurrection. Thomas wasn't there. He didn't believe Jesus had risen from the dead. Like many of us, we need to see with our own eyes before we believe. But Christ appears to him a week later and Thomas confesses, "My Lord and my God." What a beautiful act of faith!!

Mercy Overflowing: This Sunday is Divine Mercy Sunday. After Jesus appeared to the apostles on Easter Sunday, he said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained." He is instituting the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Jesus appeared to St. Faustina, a Polish nun, in the 1930s asking her to spread the message of divine mercy. The message is nothing new, but is a reminder of what the Church has always taught through scripture and tradition: that God is merciful and forgiving and that we, too, must show mercy and forgiveness. But in the Divine Mercy devotion, the message takes on a powerful new focus, calling people to a deeper understanding that God's love is unlimited and available to everyone — especially the greatest sinners. The message of mercy is that God loves us - all of us -no matter how great our sins. He wants us to recognize that His mercy is greater than our sins, so that we will call upon Him with trust, receive His mercy, and let it flow through us to others. I will be at Holy Redeemer Parish (our parishes rotate every year) this afternoon participating in Divine Mercy, including hearing confessions.

Garage Sale: Once again our wonderful 55 and Over Club will be having a garage sale April 28 and 29 in our parish hall. I hope you can stop by. It's amazing how many people attend this event.

St. Francis Prayer Center: Parishioner Deb Hawley is the one who helps coordinate all of our healing services. She is also the Director of the St. Francis Prayer Center on the north end of Flint. She could really use our help. This Saturday, April 29, the prayer center is having its annual auction. It's being held at the Holy Redeemer Parish Center with dinner beginning at 5 pm, followed by a live and silent auction. 8th Graders Visit Our Nation's Capital

Holy Family School eighth graders were sent off to Washington, D.C., on March 16th with a beautiful blessing by Fr. Gary. The students left on a bus that Thursday evening and spent three very busy days touring the Washington, D.C. area.

A tour of the Gettysburg Battlefield made history come alive for the students on the first morning of their trip. Later that day they had a tour of the National Cathedral. Their evening was spent on an illuminated tour of the Jefferson, WWII, and Air Force memorials.

On the second morning the students took a personal tour of the National Archives. The next stop was Arlington National Cemetery, where the students witnessed the changing of the guard's ceremony and four students participated in a wreath-laying ceremony. The students also toured the Capitol and the Library of Congress. They visited the Holocaust Museum where a few students met a Holocaust survivor. After a little souvenir shopping they had dinner at King Street Blues and then walked to the Pentagon Memorial. That concluded day two.



The final day began with Mass at the Shrine of the Immaculate Conception. After Mass they visited the St. John Paul II Center, the American History Museum and the Newseum, an interactive museum. The students finished their trip with a visit to the Kennedy Center where they took a visual tour of the city from the rooftop. Their last dinner stop was at the National Harbor where they also were able to get some exercise before the long ride home.

<u>**Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults</u>** RCIA: Easter Vigil and Mystagogy: Savoring the Mystery of God</u>

The Easter Vigil - what a glorious night! This is the night when we heard the saving love of our Creator God through the Old Testament readings and the fulfillment of His promises to us in the resurrection of His Son, Jesus Christ, in the New Testament readings. This is the night where our Easter Alleluia's rang out and we renewed our baptismal promises. This is the night where our Elect were reborn into new life in Christ through Baptism, where they, along with the rest of our Candidates, professed their faith in the Holy Trinity and in the teachings of Holy Mother Church and received the outpouring of the gifts of the Holy Spirit through Confirmation. This is the night where they all received Jesus into their hearts for the first time through Holy Communion. Truly, what a night!

A profound experience - almost too good to be true - yet it is the truest reality. Anyone who has ever been in love and is new to the overwhelming experience of it, needs time to reflect on what has happened to them. During the Easter Season, our newest members will enter into a period known as Mystagogy - a period of "savoring the mystery of God." Over these next few weeks, they will reflect on the Easter Sacraments and "look backward" to a specific moment(s) when they experienced God's mysterious presence. Through the grace of the Holy Spirit, this time to" look backward" will provide them with direction and renewed commitment for moving forward in their faith journey. Just like looking back at graduation, ordination or wedding pictures can give us more hope and joy for the future, reflecting on the experience of the "mysteries" - the sacraments - can renew our commitment to live as sons and daughters of God.

Mystagogy is not just something that happens in the RCIA process. We are all called to enter into and savor the mystery of God when we participate in the Liturgy and in our daily lives. Our God who loves us so completely, so unconditionally, so radically, is always revealing Himself to us - He just asks that we be open to Him and He will do the rest. "How have I encountered God this week?", How have I encountered Christ in the Liturgy this week?" These are questions to ask the Holy Spirit in prayer and trust that He will reveal the answers to you and the reality that our God is closer to us than our own breath, than our own heartbeat.



Jubilee Year of Fatima Granting of Plenary Indulgence

In order to celebrate with dignity the centennial of the Apparitions of Fatima, by mandate of Pope Francis, a Jubilee Year is granted, with the inherent plenary indulgence, from the 27th of November 2016 until the 26th of November 2017.

The plenary indulgence of the jubilee is granted:

a) To the faithful who visit the Sanctuary of Fatima on pilgrimage and devotedly participate in some celebration or prayer in honor of the Virgin Mary, pray the 'Our Father,' recite the symbol of the faith (Creed) and invoke Our Lady of Fatima;

b) To the pious faithful who visit with devotion an image of Our Lady of Fatima, solemnly displayed for public veneration in any temple, oratory or adequate place, on the anniversary days of the apparitions (the 13th of each month, from May to October 2017), and who devotedly participate there in some celebration or prayer in honor of the Virgin Mary, pray the 'Our Father,' recite the symbol of the faith (Creed) and invoke Our Lady of Fatima; c) To the faithful who, due to their age, illness or another serious cause, are hindered of moving, if repented of all their sins and with the firm intention to carry out, as soon as it will be possible to them, the three conditions indicated below, in front of a small image of Our Lady of Fatima, on the days of the apparitions, joining spiritually the jubilee celebrations, offering with confidence to the merciful God through Mary their prayers and pains, or the sacrifices of their own life.

In order to obtain plenary indulgences, the faithful who are truly repentant and filled with charity must fulfill the following ritual conditions: sacramental confession, Eucharistic communion and prayer for the intentions of the Holy Father.

Please join us as we offer the opportunity of receiving an indulgence by Pope Francis during this special **100th Anniversary of the Miracle of Fatima**. To fulfill this indulgence, as stated in item 'b.)' Our Lady of Fatima statues will be present at several local churches listed below on the 13th day of every month starting in May through October. There will be booklets at the church with prayers and other information regarding this indulgence.

Around the Diocese

Saints for the Week (April 23 - 29)

April 23: St. George

Legend states that St. George was born at Cappadocia and instructed in the Christian religion by his mother. He became a soldier in the Roman army and confronted Diocletian, the cruel persecutor of Christians. As a result, George was handed over to the torturers, who tried every means to put him to death; but he came through all the tortures unscathed. Pretending to offer sacrifice to the pagan idols, with all the people assembled, George prayed and fire came down from heaven, killing all the pagan priests and people. In the end, George was beheaded. The crusaders considered St. George to be their patron. He was also named the patron of England in 1222. Until 1778 the feast of St. George was a holy day of obligation for English Catholics. In iconography, St. George is portrayed as the conqueror of the dragon.

April 24: St. Fidelis of Sigmaringen

St. Fidelis was born in Sigmaringen in Germany in 1578. He entered the Order of Friars Minor Capuchins and led an austere life of penance, vigils and prayer. He was continuously engaged in preaching the word of God and he was commissioned by the Sacred Congregation for the Propagation of the Faith to preach in the canton of the Grisons. In 1622 he was attacked by a band of heretics and suffered martyrdom at Seewis in Switzerland.

April 25: St. Mark the Evangelist

St. Mark was a cousin of Barnabas and he accompanied St. Paul on his first missionary journey and later went with

Adrian Dominican Sister Susan Van Baalen, OP, is presenting the five-part series from 9:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. on Wednesdays in May. The series is set up for participants to attend one or more of the programs: Hinduism, May 3; Buddhism, May 10; Confucianism/Daoism, May 17; Judaism, May 24; and Islam, May 31. Christianity is not discussed in this series because of the assumption that many people in our culture are Christian or familiar with that religion.

Sister Susan will introduce each religion with a survey of its deities, historical development, sacred writings, beliefs, practices and rituals, and ethics and belief system. He was a disciple of St. Peter whose teaching was the basis for Mark's gospel. Mark is said to be the founder of the church of Alexandria.

April 28: St. Peter Chanel and St. Louis Grignion de Montfort

St. Peter was born in the town of Cuet in France in 1803. After ordination to the priesthood, he was engaged in pastoral work for a few years. He then joined the Marists and journeyed to Oceania to preach the Gospel. Despite many hardships he converted some of the natives to the faith. Out of hatred for the faith, a band of native warriors killed him in 1841 on the island of Futuna.

St. Louis de Montfort was born to a poor family at Montfort -La-Cane in Brittany. Ordained at twenty-seven, he was devoted to the Blessed Virgin Mary. He wrote books such as The Secret of the Rosary and True Devotion to Mary. He founded an order of priests called the Company of Mary and a religious institute of women devoted to the poor, the Congregation of the Daughters of Divine Wisdom.

April 29: St. Catherine of Siena

St. Catherine was born at Siena in 1347. While still a young girl, she sought the way of perfection and entered the Third Order of St. Dominic. On fire with love of God and neighbor, she established peace and concord between cities, vigorously fought for the rights and freedom of the Roman Pontiff, convincing him to return to Rome from Avignon. St. Catherine received the stigmata. She also promoted the renewal of religious life. She composed works of doctrine and spiritual inspiration. She died in 1380.
