




Brothers and sisters:

GOSPEL: John 11:1-45

Now a man was ill, Lazarus from Bethany, the village of Mary and her sister Martha. Mary was the one who had anointed the Lord with perfumed oil and dried his feet with her hair;

it was her brother Lazarus who was ill.

So the sisters sent word to him saying, "Master, the one you love is ill." When Jesus heard this he said, "This illness is not to end in death, but is for the glory of God, that the Son of God may be glorified through it." Now Jesus loved Martha and her sister and Lazarus.

So when he heard that he was ill, he remained for two days in the place where he was.

Then after this he said to his disciples, "Let us go back to Judea."

The disciples said to him, "Rabbi, the Jews were just trying to stone you, and you want to go back there?"

Jesus answered, "Are there not twelve hours in a day?

If one walks during the day, he does not stumble, because he sees the light of this world.

But if one walks at night, he stumbles, because the light is not in him."

He said this, and then told them, "Our friend Lazarus is asleep, but I am going to awaken him." So the disciples said to him, "Master, if he is asleep, he will be saved."

But Jesus was talking about his death, while they thought that he meant ordinary sleep.

So then Jesus said to them clearly, "Lazarus has died.

And I am glad for you that I was not there, that you may believe.

Let us go to him."

So Thomas, called Didymus, said to his fellow disciples, "Let us also go to die with him."

When Jesus arrived, he found that Lazarus had already been in the tomb for four days. Now Bethany was near Jerusalem, only about two

miles away. And many of the Jews had come to Martha and

Mary to comfort them about their brother. When Martha heard that Jesus was coming, she went to meet him; but Mary sat at home.

Martha said to Jesus, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died.

But even now I know that whatever you ask of God, God will give you.* Jesus said to her.

"Your brother will rise." Martha said to him, "I know he will rise, in the resurrection on the last day."

Jesus told her, "I am the resurrection and the life; whoever believes in me, even if he dies, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die.

Do you believe this?"

She said to him, "Yes, Lord.

I have come to believe that you are the Christ, the Son of God, the one who is coming into the world."

When she had said this, she went and called her sister Mary secretly, saying, "The teacher is here and is asking for you."

As soon as she heard this, she rose quickly and went to him.

For Jesus had not yet come into the village, but was still where Martha had met him.

So when the Jews who were with her in the house

comforting her saw Mary get up quickly and go out, they followed her, presuming that she was going to the tomb to weep there.

When Mary came to where Jesus was and saw him, she fell at his feet and said to him, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died."

When Jesus saw her weeping and the Jews who had come with her weeping, he became perturbed and deeply troubled, and said, "Where have you laid him?"

They said to him, "Sir, come and see." And Jesus wept.

So the Jews said, "See how he loved him." But some of them said, "Could not the one who opened the eyes of the blind man have done something so that this man would not have died?"

So Jesus, perturbed again, came to the tomb. It was a cave, and a stone lay across it. Jesus said, "Take away the stone." Martha, the dead man's sister, said to him, "Lord, by now there will be a stench; he has been dead for four days."

Jesus said to her, "Did I not tell you that if you believe you will see the glory of God?" So they took away the stone. And Jesus raised his eyes and said,

"Father, I thank you for hearing me. I know that you always hear me; but because of the crowd here I have said this, that they may believe that you sent me."

And when he had said this,

He cried out in a loud voice, "Lazarus, come out!" The dead man came out, tied hand and foot with burial bands, and his face was wrapped in a cloth. So Jesus said to them, "Untie him and let him go."

Now many of the Jews who had come to Mary and seen what he had done began to believe in him.



Gospel Meditation

Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture **5th Sunday of Lent**

Even though we say that we believe, there is a part of us that doesn't. There are many times in our lives when we experience death, whether it be the physical death of someone we love, a failed relationship, the loss of a job, or a broken dream. As we are going through these death experiences, we can easily find ourselves reaching out to God to make it better and fix it! We think that the proper order of life is to maintain the things of this world, especially those things that are essential to our sense of well-being and security. We do not like change. The grieving that comes from our death experiences can keep us stuck and in despair. If we have lost something or someone of great value, the very meaning and essence of life is lost with them. We need gentle companions to lift us from despair and that is precisely who God desires to be in our life as well.

God calls us out of our tombs, where we have been closed up in fear and despair, and shouts, "Come out!" He desperately wants to show us the path to hope and the new life that is possible after loss and death. But our faith can be weak, and we still prefer to cling to the memory of what we had rather than the joyful possibilities of tomorrow. We sometimes live as if God is not real and that the transformative power of His resurrected presence is a story found in the Bible rather than a narrative unfolding in our lives.

God is the God of surprises, not our demise. God opens new possibilities, begins new chapters, creates new verses, and brings us to new heights! We spend so much time and energy ruminating over what we left behind yesterday that we are far too tired to see what can unfold tomorrow. Loving someone new doesn't negate our past loves. Embracing the love of a person, God, or life itself tomorrow doesn't diminish the love of yesterday. Each of our loves is different, and one cannot be replaced by another. They don't cancel each other out. God truly has tended to every detail of our lives, and if we listen to each detail, we find that they all lead us back to Him. Jesus wants us to come out of our closed-up tombs. Are we going to listen this time?

Easter Flower Memorials are a great way to remember a loved one and help create a beautiful atmosphere for the celebration of new life in the Risen Lord.



Even though we are not able to have a large display of flowers this Easter (we are hopeful to have some), your memorial to the Flower Fund will support us as we move forward to supply flowers from Easter Sunday to Pentecost (If we are gathering again). And also, when we move into our new church building, we will want to shower it with the beauty of fresh flowers.

Lenten Opportunities

Hi again, everyone! Last week I wrote a bit on the different spiritual activities we can practice during what will now be a three-week stay-at-home order. I don't know about you but it seems very daunting to refrain from seeing friends, loved ones, and doing all the activities we usually love to do for three more weeks. Jesus is here. He is with us. When he went into the desert for forty days before Lent He knew exactly what would be going on with us here during Lent in 2020. He knows your struggles. He knows your pain. He understands, and He loves you. This is a difficult time for all of us. Please reach out over the phone to those you love if you need to. Most of all, please reach out to Christ. In this desert time one verse from Scripture comes to mind: "The wilderness and the solitary place shall be glad for them; and the desert shall rejoice, and blossom as the rose" Isaiah 35:1. We are in the desert, but we are not abandoned in our solitude since God is always with us. He is working ALL of this, somehow, for our good.

One of the activities I mentioned in last week's article is praying a family rosary. I remember every Lent my mom would gather us together at night to pray the rosary. It wasn't anything super fancy or complicated, but I remember that those prayers shaped my relationship with Mary and with God, as well as strengthened my relationship with my whole family. When we came together to pray, our family opened the door to God for all the graces we would need. Right now you may feel on edge with your family as activities are cancelled and we are all supposed to stay home. This could be a great way to reconnect and center back on God in our second week off school. If you live alone or do not have kids, praying the rosary is still an excellent way to take time away with God - perhaps you could even call a friend and ask them to pray it with you! Mary loves hearing the prayer intentions that you want to bring to Jesus!

Though it is Lent, I would like to suggest that this week you focus on the luminous mysteries since I think we could all use a little light right now. These are: the baptism of the Lord, the wedding in Cana, the proclamation of the kingdom of God, the transfiguration, and the institution of the Eucharist.

We are praying for you and can't wait to see you back in Church when we can gather again!

A brief audition and interview with our Music Ministry Project Committee may be scheduled. The

Fasting and Abstinence

Those who are physically capable are called to abstain from eating meat on Ash Wednesday and during the Fridays in Lent. Fasting (Ash Wednesday and Good Friday) consists of one full meatless meal and other limited meatless meals as required to maintain strength. The young, the elderly, and those with health issues are not required to fast. The discipline of fasting and abstinence should be done in a spirit of prayer and with the goal of making a sacrifice in order to draw closer to the Lord.

Rosary Makers Guild - Rosary "Coast-to-Coast"

The Rosary Makers Guild of Holy Family invites you to join them in praying the rosary, asking for Our Lady's intercession to help us with this intention - to eradicate the Coronavirus. Here is how it works. Every Thursday at 12:00 Noon our rosary guild will be praying a rosary, each from their homes, but at that time, and we invite you to join us. If noon is not a good time for you, we invite you to pray a rosary on Thursdays for the eradication of the coronavirus.

If you have a smart phone, iPad, computer or other device, YouTube offers many options for the rosary. Search International Rosary-EWTN and a selection of options pop up.

Ask for their intercession.....

Let us call upon the intercession of St. Rosalia, Patron Saint of Palermo, Sicily,1625, feast day Sept 4th. She lived in a cave, for a love of the Lord in the city of Palermo. In 1624, a plague beset Palermo. During this hardship Saint Rosalia appeared first to a sick woman, then to a hunter, to whom she indicated where her remains were to be found. She ordered him to bring her bones to Palermo and have them carried in procession through the city.



The hunter climbed the mountain and found her bones in the cave as described. He did what she had asked in the apparition. After her remains were carried around the city three times, the plague ceased. After this Saint Rosalia was venerated as the patron saint of Palermo, and a sanctuary was built in the cave where her remains were discovered.

St. Rosalia.....pray for us.

Let us call upon the intercession of St. Roch, 1295-1327. He was blessed to be born with a red cross on his chest. He was the only son of a wealthy governor in France. When he was 20 he left home and sailed on a ship to Italy. He gave away all his money in Italy and devoted his life to the plague-stricken, curing them with the Sign of the Cross. He was badly beaten and went into the woods to die. Dogs found him and licked his wounds and healed St. Roch (he is also known as the patron saint of dogs). He returned to France and was thrown into prison where he died and was known for his numerous miracles which attested to his sanctity.

St. Roch.....pray for us.

In Italy today the citizens are praying to each of these saints for a miracle and to stop the Coronavirus/COVID-19.

Thank you, everyone, for coming together to pray desperately to Mary, Our Mother, to heal all infected with the virus and protect us from it and for COVID-19 to come to an end.


