

A CUP OF JOE

Greetings in Christ, all! This is the feast of Epiphany: the day we commemorate the arrival of the Magi from the East (present Iran) to honor the child Jesus. It's a reminder to us that God's Kingdom is for everyone: not a select group, not a specific ethnicity...everyone!

It's part of our Catholic custom that we bless our homes on this day. To that end, we've provided



all the necessary tools and instructions for the Epiphany blessing. Envelopes are located in the gathering space. Please take one for your family. It's a short, really neat activity the family can do together today. I urge you to partake!

There is some sad news for us to pray about. This month, St. Pius X Catholic Church in Flint closes. That parish has served the people in Flint for quite some time. I'm asking us to place those good people in our hearts and pray for them. Should any of them choose to find a Spiritual Home here with us, let's welcome them and love on them.

I want to end this article with a thank you and a review. Last weekend I spoke at every Mass to give a sort of "State of the Parish" address. I hated not preaching, but we really prayed and this seemed to be where God was leading us. Not talking about Jesus bums me out and, as a result, I felt a bit insecure about it. So many of you were encouraging and kind in your response and that really helped me be at peace. Thank you with all my heart.

For those who weren't here last weekend or who need a reminder, here it is in a nutshell.

Our Parish, School and Outreach to those in need are thriving. Our finances are good and we have no debt. People are returning to the practice of the faith in good numbers and our confession lines are wonderfully busy. We have our organ pipe installation contracted and work will begin in January 2025. Praise God!

We have some challenges for this next year that I want us to pray about and be ready for. This year, assuming we can find workers, we will build a sort of Super Structure on our property. We will use this large building as an office place for our maintenance, as well as a garage and storage for our outdoor work and tools. We will also use half of it for our Outreach Ministry. We are very excited about this.

As soon as that is complete, we will tear down the two houses and all the little sheds on our property. The houses cannot be saved without a significant investment that would end up exceeding the amount of money we'll spend on our new building.

The place in the gathering space where the organ pipes are currently located will be replaced with a large, attractive wooden structure that houses statues of Jesus, Mary, Joseph and the 12 Apostles. I'm a statue guy so I'm ridiculously excited about this as well.

We have a very serious problem on our grounds: the area between the Church, School and Rectory was not built to handle the drainage area it has become. Bricks and concrete are breaking down. I have a lot of info on this, but the short version is we are going to have to tear that whole area out and rebuild it in a way that allows access to the lower parking lot, but still deals with water runoff in a way that isn't destructive to the rectory garage and the school gym/parish hall.

Finally, the Diocese is going to have another Capital Campaign, probably starting this year for us. I'll have more info on this as we get closer to commencing the campaign, but we are going to combine our need to fix that area I wrote about above with whatever goal is set for us.

I then asked if any family is in a position to give, but does not currently give, to please consider doing so. We've done a lot of wonderful work with 25% of our parish donating regularly and it's my belief that if we can get that percentage up, we could do so much more. Please consider going online and signing up for regular donations.

I closed by asking everyone to pray that we at Holy Family will be faithful to our mission and that God would protect us from evil.

Whew! That's a lot of typing. Thanks for sticking with me. Next week I hope to have more detail and updates for you on how wonderfully God has blessed us.

Thank you for letting Le and me be your priests. We think we are the most blessed priests in the world.



Chalking the Door

This year we invite you to join us in the tradition of

"chalking the door" to celebrate the Epiphany. The Epiphany marks the arrival of the magi to the place where Jesus was born and the end of Christmas. This year it will be celebrated on Sunday, January 7 (typically celebrated on January 6, the 12th day of Christmas). Envelopes with the prayer and blessed chalk are available in the Gathering Space for you to participate at your home.



"Chalking the door" is a sign and symbol of asking God's blessing upon those who live, work, or visit throughout the coming year. In Exodus, the Israelites marked their doors with blood so that the Lord would pass over their homes; but in this service, we mark our doors with chalk as a sign inviting God's presence and blessing into our homes.

The letters C M B come from the traditional names for the three kings: Caspar, Melchior, and Balthazar. It is also an abbreviation for "Christus Mansionem Benedicat" which means, "May Christ bless this dwelling!" The first and last numbers simply refer to the current year.

Pray: Lord God of heaven and earth, you revealed your only begotten Son to every nation by the guidance of a star. Bless this house and all who live here and all who visit. May we be blessed with health, kindness of heart, gentleness and the keeping of your law. Fill us with the light of Christ, that our love for each other may go out to all. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

120th Pope - Anastasius III

Born in Rome, he was elected bishop of Rome and ruler of the Papal States in April 911. He was favored on the basis of his impeccable morality and his virtuous behavior, a quality which had been lacking in his predecessor. In the two



years of his pontificate he was not able to achieve much because of the persistent internal disorders. He suffered the pressures exerted by Berengarius I. However, during his pontificate a large number of Normans located in a Northern region of France, converted to Christianity. The name Normandy derives from them. Pope Anastasius III died in June 913 and the suspicion of poisoning accompanied his death.



No Neighbor Left Behind

In 2023 the Knights helped 375 families and 19 different outreaches/organizations/pregnancy centers, providing more than 4,032 household items to the families and more than 1,410 items to the non-profits. We provide families in need with furniture, appliances, pots, pans and dishes. We deliver clothes, food and special requests to Holy Family and other area outreaches.

Thank you to Holy Family Outreach and all who help with donations, pickups and deliveries.

Since September of 2021, we have served 599 families, 308 of which were referred to us by one of the 51 different non-profit organizations we work with. We have delivered over 6,562 household items.

We currently have 141 families waiting for us to find/deliver 1,074 items for them. We especially need beds, dressers, appliances, and kitchen tables, in addition to silverware, pots and pans. We cannot deliver what we have in storage fast enough, so if you can help deliver to a family, it would be a blessing to them.

Special thanks to all those who have donated to our fundraiser to purchase a high roof van, which will allow us to deliver beds in the rain. We have received over 39% of our goal! 





January 7: St. Raymond Peñafort

In his early 30s he earned a doctorate in both canon and civil law. At 41 he became a Dominican. Pope Gregory IX called him to Rome to work for him and to be his confessor. One of the things the pope asked him to do was to gather together all the decrees of popes and councils that had been made in 80 years since a similar collection by Gratian. Raymond compiled five books called the Decretals. They were


Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

The Epiphany of the Lord

A stranger in a foreign land, I was exhausted and home-sick as my summer Spanish immersion ended in Guate-mala. The rusty minivan arriving outside my small residence filled me with joyful hope. I was flying home to the U.S. and would be, at long last, completely happy. Or so I thought. After about half an hour of being home, I thought to myself, "This place is boring. I want to go somewhere." So, I hopped in my car and left to see my friends. As I drove, I wistfully wondered, "Where am I *truly* at home?"

The feast of Epiphany has a lot to do with our notion of home. Where is our origin? Where are we going? When is our wandering done? Saint Matthew tells us of the Magi,

"They were overjoyed at seeing the star." This star will bring them home, to a place where their questing will end, and they will be satisfied. Their real home is neither in the East nor in the earthly Jerusalem. Somehow, their home is wherever this boy



and his parents are.

If you're a teenager or older, you probably know by now that every physical home we have is temporary. So, we look up at the countless stars in our proverbial skies: things which bedazzle and beckon us to follow toward peace. The Gospel invites us to behold that — at long last — God has sent us a star to follow home, one that whispers, "Follow me! I will take you home!" Perhaps that star is your spouse. A friend. An opportunity. A cause. An intuition about a new direction. A prayer group. What is it for you? How will you know? It will lead you to Mary and Joseph and their son, and you will be home.




