


St. Michael the Archangel

A CUP OF JOE

Greetings in Christ! As I type this, I am processing the fact that Proposal 3 passed. My heart is broken. Clearly, we've decided that humans will decide when a life begins; not science, not reason. However discouraged or happy you are about this, let's all remember that our hope is Jesus, not laws and rules. We can still love, we can still sacrifice, we can still proclaim to everyone who asks how deeply we revere life.



Last week Fr. Le and I were supposed to talk about vocations, but honestly, I somehow missed all that and I'm so sorry. I've really been struggling more than usual to keep up with all the needs and demands along with being sick. Fr. Le and I talked with the Leadership Team and we all agreed that we will use this weekend to talk about priesthood.

I'm in my 25th year of being a priest and I'm slowly learning how to live this vocation more strategically. Priesthood is changing in a radical way and as a historian I can tell you it's the most drastic change that I am aware of in Church History. You are truly living in historic times in that regard.

The specific Church I grew up in had two priests taking care of us 400 families. Now, you have two priests taking care of two parishes with a total of over 2600 families, as well as a school. There are more Catholics than ever in our country and an incredibly small number of priests serving them.

I think that as tough as this time might be, it is a good opportunity for us priests to allow ourselves to focus on being priests and let go of the power-oriented approach. Fr. Le and I work hard to focus on the things that only we can do: **anoint the sick**, **give last rites**, **baptize**, **hear confessions**, **pray weddings and funerals**, **offer the holy Mass**...this is what priests do. If we do nothing but these things, that is more than a full-time job each week. Alas, we also have to deal with budgeting, religious ed, a school, personnel, annulments, finance councils, Church laws and rules, insurance, our own families and a myriad of other things.

For a lot of our history, priests led parish lives that were much smaller, much simpler and with fewer demands. In the words of one of the older priests in our diocese: "When I was a younger man, we had twice as many priests doing 1/8th of what is required now."

So, what do we priests do? God seems to be teaching me slowly but surely, that the key is for me to focus on what I

am made to do, what I can do and to spread the rest out among qualified people. For me this has involved creating a leadership team and working with them. This team walks with me through almost every decision, we pray together, talk through issues, hold each other accountable and strive to speak with one voice so that everything flows from a fidelity to our mission as a parish. We've worked hard to create a team that can fill the gaps priests used to do (for good and ill): counseling, budgeting, practical concerns and all the other things, not just for the practical limitations, but because too much power in the hands of anyone is corrosive to the soul.

The fruits of this are hard for some of you; change is always tough. I know that the folks saying "No" on my behalf get talked about and yelled at. It breaks my heart. But all of this is to move us from an understanding of the Pastor as CEO and/or Supreme Dictator into an understanding of the Pastor as a minister of the sacraments, a teacher and servant.

In the end each activity at our parish happens in a context of an amazingly complicated reality: it's never as easy as it looks. **Our mission is to worship God, care for the poor and vulnerable and to bring people to Christ.** That's it. Between my two parishes, we have over ten hours of confessions a week, we celebrate Mass 14 times, plus any weddings and funerals. We are daily running to the hospitals to be with people as they die and to pray with those who are sick. I absolutely love it and thank Jesus every day that this is what he made me for.

So many of you have made it so easy. You've allowed me to be a priest and to share power so that I can be an effective priest. I am so grateful. It is my deep conviction that this vision of Priesthood that is emerging is more closely aligned with the life of Jesus and is good for all involved. Some priests have the time and skills to be counselors, some do not. Some have the time and skill to teach, others do not. One thing every priest can and must do is focus on the Sacraments and Personal Holiness. So, that's it. I can't believe Jesus lets me do this and I can't believe how ridiculously blessed I feel to serve you. You are all a light in my life and I can't wait to see what fruit our upcoming years together bring.

Priesthood is so much more life giving, challenging and wonderful than I ever could have dreamed and a big part of that is because of you.

With all my heart, thank you.

Our Catholic Heritage

60th Pope – Pelagius I Born in Rome, he was elected on April 16, 556. His elevation to the papacy was influenced by Emperor Justinian, since Rome was now a Province of the Byzantine Empire. Pope Pelagius I saw difficult times as vicar of Rome,

because he was charged with defending the city from a blockade invasion by Totila, the King of the Goths. During this siege, Pope Pelagius I used his private wealth to help the hungry in Rome and was subsequently nicknamed 'Father of the Poor.' He also used his wealth to bring about a truce with King Totila and save his city from war and death. He remained

faithful to the principles of Catholic orthodoxy. Finally, he commissioned the building of Santi Dodici Apostoli Church in dedication of the 12 Apostles. Pope Pelagius I died March 4, 561, and was buried in St. Peter's Basilica.

How it works:

shop the Black Friday sales. If you are unable to attend Mass and wish to obtain an Angel tag, please call Nancy Repuyan at (810) 444-8896 **prior to November 19th** and she'll give you a child's name and information.

- Purchase your gift(s) for each child. Suggested amount is \$30-\$40 per child. Please keep in mind there may be several items requested. These are simply ideas; you do not have to purchase all items requested. Gift cards are appropriate for anyone over 15 but not younger.
- Wrap your gift (s). Cut the top portion of your tag and attach it to your wrapped gift, making sure the child's first name and the code number is visible. This identifies the child's family and makes it easier to gather all gifts for that family in one bundle.

Gifts may be brought back anytime **through Sunday**, **December 13th**, to the Gathering Space. The Soup Kitchen will be picking them up Tuesday, December 15th, and we'll need the 14th to determine that every child is accounted for.

November 13: Saint Albert the Great



Saint Albert was born at Lauingen along the Danube about the year 1206. Having studied at Padua and Paris, he entered the Order of Preachers (the Dominicans) and excelled as a teacher. One of his most famous studies was St. Thomas Aquinas. Ordained bishop of Ratisbon, he strove earnestly to establish peace among peoples and between cities. He wrote brilliantly on a variety of subjects from the secular to the sacred. He died at Cologne in 1280.

WHAT'S HAPPENING HERE

Gospel Meditation Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

Many make it their life's ambition to determine precisely when the world will end. By reading the signs of the times, consulting scripture, or looking to prophetic predictions that are sometimes centuries old, they claim a certain credibility in being able to do so. Is all that necessary to know? Even when his disciples pointedly ask him this question, Jesus does not directly answer. While the end will inevitably come, Jesus points out that there is a lot we need to do first: remain faithful, face persecution, endure suffering, face wars and insurrections, and give testimony. Human beings tend to focus their energies on the wrong kingdom. Consumed with all of the things we have built and seeking to preserve them, we forget that we belong to a different kingdom, the Kingdom of God.

All of the "stuff" we have constructed will be taken away. All that will remain is God's kingdom. Which kingdom do we prefer? We answer that question by honestly looking at where we invest most of our time and energy. What matters to us as we embrace a new moment or day in our lives? If our relationship with God, the strength and integrity of our souls, and the steadfastness of our character are of utmost importance, then it matters little when the physi-

cal end will come. We will have what we need to persevere, endure, and confront whatever comes our way. Jesus cautions



that we do not allow ourselves to be overwhelmed or overly terrified by the agonies and disappointments of the world. Although we may be apprehensive and uncertain when faced with complex challenges, God is with us. We will receive the inspiration we need to forge ahead.

God is a God of salvation and new beginnings. Whether we consider the daily unfolding of our earthly lives or our eternal ones to come, God never leaves us with dead ends. There is always hope, and there is always something new to come. As Julian of Norwich reminds us, "God made us, God loves us and God keeps us." This wisdom holds true whether life is stable and profitable or challenging and uncertain. If we remember this simple truth, we will be ready regardless of the day or the hour.
