A Cup of Joe

Greetings in Christ, all and HAPPY BIRTHDAY!

Okay, so why the Happy Birthday? Because this week we celebrate the birthday of our Church building. On December 12th, 2020, we celebrated our first Mass here, a Mass of dedication with Bishop Earl Boyea.

I would like to thank you with all my heart for your generosity, patience

and prayerful support: those are the things we needed for this to happen. God gave us the means and we built Him a Church where we could worship Him, have our sins forgiven, baptize our kids, bury our dead, join together in eternal matrimony...all kinds of happy.

I'd like to take a moment to remind us of some things about our Church building that are important.

Our Church was designed and built in a classical manner: confessionals and baptismal font at the door, with the altar in the East. This is the way Churches were built for most of the history of Christianity. We enter through baptism and confession, we move forward to the altar. When I thought of this, I used this Scripture verse:

"Since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off every encumbrance of sin and press forward with our eyes fixed on Jesus, who inspires and perfects our faith."

The goal is for us to think of heaven here, so I made sure we were "surrounded by the cloud of witnesses," the saints who we represent by the crosses in the floor (each one has a saint medal underneath it) and the saints represented in our statues and, someday, in our ceiling art.

We used the Jerusalem Cross throughout our Church, as a reminder that Heaven is our "Heavenly Jerusalem." Our windows give us the liturgical feasts for each year, as well as the Corporal Works of Mercy and the Spiritual Works of Mercy.

There's more within our Church construction, but I'm running out of room and want to remind you of our future projects, as well:

- Our baptismal font was funded by an anonymous donor and should be going in relatively soon. The supply chain troubles in our country are a big problem and the reason for the delay.
- We will have new, more colorful statues of Our Mother and St. Joseph up at the altar, as well as a statue of Solanus Casey where we currently have the Sacred Heart of Jesus statue.

- We will soon have a beautiful Reliquary in the front of the Church to the right of the altar. This area will host our **Five First Class Relics** of saints and give us a place to pray there. I still can't believe we are doing this!
- Our Organ Pipes will be moved to the front of the Church. Hopefully, you remember that we have the space set aside for them and all that is left now is to move and install them. This will be a lot of money and we will work hard to secure the funding.
- There will be some decorations and paint work around the Blessed Sacrament as soon as we have the money.
- We will tear down the house where we serve the poor and move that elsewhere. This will honor our agreement with the city and provide us with about 11 more parking spaces.
- We will add an overhang outside the Church's main doors which will allow us to drop off our families and park our cars during bad weather.

What I hoped for in putting the Church together is a place that is unique in our culture, a place that inspires in us the warmth of familiarity, the message of hope and a focus on Jesus. I pray that each year, we grow in love of God and each other by our worship here.

Thank you for letting me be your priest.



December 18: St. Dominic of Silos

Dominic of Silos, was born in Spain around the year 1000 into a peasant family. As a young boy he spent time in the

fields, where he welcomed the solitude. He became a Benedictine priest and served in numerous leadership positions. Following a dispute with the king over property, Dominic and two other monks were exiled. They established a new monastery in what at first seemed an unpromising location. Under Dominic's leadership, however, it became one of the most famous houses in Spain. Many healings were reported there. About 100 years after Dominic's death, a young woman made a pilgrimage to his tomb. There Dominic of Silos appeared to her and assured her that she would bear another son.



The woman was Joan of Aza, and the son she bore grew up to be the "other" Dominic—the one who founded the Dominicans.

Born in Fondi, in the region of Latium. Elected pope in 166 during the reign of Marcus Aurelius. He is remembered for his generosity regarding the Corinthian Church which had been under grave persecution. He was described as the pope of charity. He forbid women to



burn incense during the congregation of the faithful. He ratified matrimony a sacrament, valid only if blessed by a priest. He died in 175, a martyr.



Gospel Meditation

Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

"From silly devotions and sour-faced saints, good Lord, deliver us!" St. Teresa of Avila

We've all heard the adage, "Laughter is the best medicine." In many ways, it really is. When was the last time you really laughed? The gift of imagination allows us to see possible things that are yet to be. Imagine a world filled with laughter. We take life too seriously sometimes. Fear, uncertainty, pressure, negativity, disappointment, and myriad other human experiences can rob us of the joy needed for laughter. God never promised us an easy road, and we do have to take the course of our lives seriously. However, there is a balance to be sought and a possible joy that can be brought even to the darkest and most challenging of encounters.

St. Therese of Lisieux reminds us that, "Joy is not found in the material objects surrounding us but in the inner recesses of the soul. One can possess joy in a prison cell as well as in a palace." Falling in love with God, who is present in all of creation, allows us to bring a depth of understanding to everything we do and experience. We can more easily see above and beyond things while pursuing the only One who can truly satisfy our hearts. When we realize that God, the king of Israel, is in our midst and with us, there is no

further misfortune to fear. We can celebrate the wonder and beauty of God's gift of joy. It is no wonder that many saints radiate joy and have no reservations expressing laughter. They are happy because they



have found a pearl of great price.

We celebrate with joy today with hearts filled with expectation, wonder, awe, and beauty as we ready ourselves, even more excitedly, for the coming of our Savior. Do not fear and do not be discouraged. If you haven't laughed in a while, why? Something is preventing you from expressing the magnificence of your soul and the presence of God who dwells within. God's power and presence within us assures us that we are loved and kept in that presence. What more is really needed? Rejoice and laugh in the presence of God! It really is the best medicine and a most perfect way to convince others that God is really with us. "Go ahead, laugh! Live your life with joy and serve the Lord with laughter! Joy, with peace, is the sister of charity. Serve the Lord with laughter." (St. Padre Pio of Pietrelcina)
