Greetings in Christ, all!

In our Church tradition, we have an amazing concept called The Corporal Works of Mercy. These works of mercy are depicted in our stained glass windows of our church. They are: to feed the hungry, to give drink to the thirsty, to clothe the naked, to give shelter to travelers, to visit



the sick, to visit the imprisoned, and to bury the dead.

These are the seven best things we can do as Christians and we try to do them faithfully. As part of that, my last parish school and several others in our diocese and the diocese next to us had a wonderful tradition: Whenever we had a funeral, the kids would all come out of the school and pray a part of the rosary for the dead and those who mourn them.

I cannot tell you the impact this had on our parish and our school. Families would emerge from the Church, led by the priest and servers, ready to place the casket in the hearse. As they came out the doors, they would hear the voices of our kids praying for them...it was amazing...a true blessing for our students and for the families laying their loved one to rest.

Starting very soon, we are going to do this at Holy Family. Our school is our parish and our parish is our school. We mourn together, we hope together, we pray together.

When we did this at my last parish school, the kids absolutely loved it and the people who experienced it wrote letters of gratitude for the experience. If you have kids at our school, please feel free to join them for this prayer experience anytime you are able.

<u>I also have to tell you that we are once again experiencing a high volume of scammers contacting you all</u> pretending to be me.

Please, please share this information:

As your priest, I will never, ever text or email you and ask you to send me gift cards for anyone. I will not ask you for financial assistance through email or text. I will never do that. It might look like my email address, it might appear to be me, but it is not. I do not do that.

I am so deeply saddened that these soulless monsters prey on your generous hearts and on the relationship we have formed as priest and community. I pray they repent before they face judgment. I also pray God protect you from these people.

A final note: If you get a text from me asking for bacon or cake, that is not a scam, that is me and I urge you to act without delay.

I love you all. Thank you for letting me be your priest.

Don't Live a Lie

One day, my son was explaining to his mother that he felt she had lied to him. It was nothing very important, but he wanted to take this opportunity to share how important telling the truth is to him. He explained that he simply tells it like it is in all aspects of his life. But an hour later, we caught him in a lie! Again, it was not about a matter of life and death, but it was a lie. When confronted with his own previous words on how important the telling the truth was to him, he just smiled. Yes, the guilty often have no words of defense.

Jesus said it best in Matthew 5: "Let your 'yes' mean 'yes' and your 'no' mean 'no." He was warning his disciples about false oaths and then instructing them on the fullness of the Hebrew laws. We may try to do what we say and say what we mean, but it can be all too easy to fall short. We call ourselves disciples yet provide evidence to the contrary by our actions (or lack of them).

Even if we feel that we have lied to no one, we may have lied to ourselves. We portray ourselves as generous, thankful, and loving people, yet fail to answer God's call in a situation because we perceive the cost to be too great. Jesus did not simply mean for his message to be about two words. He also meant that when you say you are a disciple, make sure you are a disciple as well.

The Activated Disciple


Join us for our parish challenge this Lent!!



Our Catholic Heritage

by Earl Hagen 73rd Pope – Theodore I

Born in Jerusalem, but was of Greek origin. He was elected pope on September 24, 642. He was firmly set against the heretical monotheist movement (the belief that Christ only had a single will) which still flourished in the Eastern Church and strengthened by the edict of Tipus. Debate



was prohibited over controversial arguments such as the double or singular will of Christ. There were grave disagreements between himself and the Eastern Emperor Constans II. He added the title of Sovereign to that of "Pontiff," thereby restoring order to the internal jurisdiction of the clergy. Theodore I died May 14, 649. It is suspected that he died of poisoning. He was buried in the Vatican Grottoes.

February 17: Seven Founders of the Servite Order In 1240 seven noblemen of Florence mutually decided to

withdraw from the city to a solitary place for prayer and direct service of God.

Their initial difficulty was providing for their dependents, since two were still married and two were widowers. Their aim was to lead a life of penance and



prayer, but they soon found themselves disturbed by constant visitors from Florence. They next withdrew to the deserted slopes of Monte Senario. In 1244, under the direction of St. Peter of Verona, O.P., this small group adopted a religious habit similar to the Dominican habit, choosing to live under the Rule of St. Augustine and adopting the name of the Servants of Mary. The new Order took a form more like that of the mendicant friars than that of the older monastic Orders.
