


### St. Michael the Archangel

## A CUP OF JOE

Greetings in Christ!

Here we are in the first week of Lent; can you believe it? The crazy part is that next year Lent starts very late. All of this is determined by Easter, which is always the First Sunday after the Paschal Full Moon (the first full moon after the Spring Equinox). From there, they subtract 40 days



(not counting Sundays) and that is Ash Wednesday.

I hope you remember that we are doing themed preaching during Lent. Each weekend Fr. Le, the Deacons and I will preach a homily based on one of the last seven phrases Christ said from the cross. Here is the schedule:

#### Feb 18 - "My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me?"

Feb 25 - "Truly, I say to you, today you will be with me in Paradise."

March 3 - "Woman, behold your son. Son, behold your mother!"

March 10 - "I Thirst"

March 17 - "Father, into thy hands I commit my spirit!"

March 24 - "It is finished"

One of the things we are asked to do during Lent is to donate and next week we will present you with an opportunity to do so through our Annual DSA collection.

Churches are totally dependent for their budgets on weekly collections. For the diocese, they don't have "a" Church, they have the care of all of them, but no means to take up weekly collections. Instead, each year, they ask every parish to donate a certain amount that combined, will help them meet their budget. I'm asking every family reading this to please prayerfully consider donating to DSA by making a pledge next week. Even if it's what you consider a small amount, it is essential to the diocese that we do our best. We have not hit our parish goal in many, many years and I hope that this year we do.


We will continue to have Easter and Christmas memorial collections as well. **During Lent and Advent there will be no flowers in church.**

### **Our Catholic Heritage**


by Earl Hagen **126th Pope - Leo VII** Born in Rome, he was a Benedictine monk, was hand picked by Alberbico II (ruler of Rome after deposing of his mother Marozia and his stepfather, King Hugh of Italy). He was elected pope in January



936. He reformed and reorganized monastic life and had the ancient Cenobite near the Basilica of St. Paul outside the walls rebuilt. Under Leo's pontificate, Alberbico II reconciled with King Hugo of Italy. Hugo in exile, had tried to win back Rome by force. And finally, he wrote to the bishops of France and Germany in condemnation of witches and fortune tellers. Pope Leo VII died July 13, 939, and is buried in St. Peter's Basilica.



#### Saint

February 21: St. Peter Damian Peter escaped poverty and the neglect of his own brother when his other brother, who was archpriest of Ravenna, took him under his wing. His brother sent him to good schools and Peter became a professor. Soon, he decided to leave his teaching and give himself completely to prayer with the Benedictines of the reform of Saint Romuald at Fonte Avellana. They lived two monks to a hermitage. Peter was so eager to pray and slept so little that he soon suffered from severe insomnia. He found he had to use some prudence in taking care of himself. When he was



not praying, he studied the Bible. The abbot commanded that when he died Peter should succeed him. Abbot Peter founded five other hermitages. He wrote many letters. Some 170 survive. We also have 53 of his sermons and seven lives, or biographies, which he wrote. He preferred examples and stories rather than theory in his writings. The liturgical offices he wrote are evidence of his talent as a stylist in Latin.







## FOLLOWING OUR FAITH



If you only learn to master one moment in your life, learn to master the moment of decision.

We all make choices. That's the easy part. The hard thing about choices is living with them. We all have regrets. We have all said and done things that we would do differently if we could go back in time. We know we can't. We may have made peace with those choices to some extent, but still, in the quiet hours they haunt us.

If I could give only one piece of advice, it would be this: Make choices that are easy to live with. Make choices you can look back on longingly, like you do upon the best of times with the best of friends.

Life is choices. We are constantly making them. But are we choosing wisely?

#### **Gospel Meditation**

Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

When I feel down, I sometimes watch the famous "Double Rainbow" video on YouTube to feel better. It's hilarious. A young man camping in Yosemite Park sees two rainbows stretching across the sky. He bursts into a kind of ecstasy. "Double rainbow, all the way! Oh my God!" he announces. Then he starts to weep. He cries out, "What does it mean?" Beneath the humor of his glorious overreaction is the deep intuition we all have, I think, when we see the colorful bow in the sky. This Sunday, God sends a rainbow to Noah, and to us. What does it mean?



Long before YouTube had the double rainbow, Dante's medieval poem The Divine Comedy featured one in his image of paradise. Seeing two rainbows, he muses that one is born of the other. The bow is God's promise of peace. For Dante, it's even more: nature's encrypted image of the Trinitarian God. One visible rainbow (God the Son) is begotten of another usually invisible one (God the Father) united by invisible light between them (God the Spirit). Like invisible light, Trinitarian glory surrounds us in every moment — but Jesus has made it visible in his glorious body.

Lenten challenge: This might seem silly, but this Lent I invite you to find a rainbow and meditate on it. You might have to make one yourself, like this current desert-dweller will. Gaze on it. See there a natural gift from the Creator, saying to you, "Here I am! I will love and protect you, surrounding you in My glory." This Lent let's embrace that with confidence, rain, or shine.


