by Earl Hagen **124th Pope - Stephen VII** Born in Rome, he was elected pope in December 928 by the powerful intrigues of the Counts of Tuscolo while Rome was governed by Marozia, Marquise of Tuscia. His title was the bishop of Rome and nominal ruler of the Papal States. Very little is known about Stephen's pontificate, however, some of his



achievements were his support for the monasteries of St. Vincent al Volturno and two cenobites in Gaul. Pope Stephen VII died February, 931.

We're thrilled to share the highlights from a remarkable year at No Neighbor Left Behind. In 2023, thanks to our dedicated volunteers and generous community support:

Doubled Impact:

The number of families served, and items delivered nearly doubled compared to 2022.

Volunteer-Powered:

Our all-volunteer team ensures every resource directly supports our mission. Almost 100% of fuel for deliveries is donated.

Impactful Numbers:

In 2023, we delivered 5535 items:

- 4064 items directly to 377 families
- 1471 items to 29 non-profits
- Community Collaboration: 43 non-profits directed families to our program, showcasing the power of collaborative outreach.

Saint

February 8: St. Josephine Bakhita

Born in Olgossa in the Darfur region of southern Sudan, Josephine was kidnapped at the age of 7, sold into slavery

and given the name Bakhita, which means fortunate. She was resold several times, finally in 1883 to Callisto Legnani, Italian consul in Khartoum, Sudan. Two years later, he took Josephine to Italy and gave her to his friend Augusto Michieli.



Bakhita became babysitter to Mimmina Michieli, whom she accompanied to Venice's Institute of the Catechumens, run by the Canossian Sisters. While Mimmina was being instructed, Josephine felt drawn to the Catholic Church. She was baptized and confirmed in 1890, taking the name Josephine. Josephine entered the Institute of St. Magdalene of Canossa in 1893 and made her profession three years later. For the next 42 years Josephine worked as cook and doorkeeper at the convent. She visited other convents to prepare sisters to work in Africa. She was always thankful to her kidnappers as if she had not been kidnapped, she might not have come to know Jesus. During World War II she was a refuge for the troubled townspeople of Schio, Italy. Schio was bombed but suffered no casualties, a miracle many attribute to the mere presence of Josephine. She remained cheerful in later years as she experienced physical pain, replying "As the Master desires." She was canonized October 1, 2000 and is the patron saint of Sudan and human trafficking survivors.

Gospel Meditation

Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture



Maybe I'm weird, but I like spending time in doctor's offices, confession lines in churches, auto repair shops, prison cells, and support groups of various kinds. It's refreshing to be with people who humbly admit something is wrong and forthrightly set out on a path toward a solution. When we ignore what is off kilter, we become alone and fragile. In places where people are honest and hopeful about brokenness, sturdy if subtle fellowship usually ensues.

Consider the image we see of Jesus in the Gospel of Mark. "...they brought to him all who were ill or possessed by a demon. The whole town was gathered at the door." The entire human community is afflicted in various ways, and so it gradually forms a strange new community around Jesus. The healer from Nazareth is like a sun of health around which orbits a throng of humanity absorbing his healing rays. These blessed souls can't fix themselves and become healthy, and they know it. But they have found in him the living source of all imaginable healing.

It's the Church, isn't it? A sin-sick community gathered and healed is what happens at the beginning of every Mass. We shuffle in through the door from everywhere and announce that we are not okay, and we can't fix it. In doing so, we are drawn into the orbit of the healing power of Christ — and into a renewed community with the whole human family. It's nothing to fear or rush. Maybe we can even learn to enjoy more how good it is to be in such a happy place.
