
Brothers and sisters:

GOSPEL: John 9:1-41

As Jesus passed by he saw a man blind from birth.

His disciples asked him, "Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his parents, that he was born blind?" Jesus answered, "Neither he nor his parents sinned; it is so that the works of God might be made visible through him.

We have to do the works of the one who sent me while it is day.

Night is coming when no one can work. While I am in the world, I am the light of the world."

When he had said this, he spat on the ground and made clay with the saliva, and smeared the clay on his eyes, and said to him, "Go wash in the Pool of Siloam" —which means Sent—.

So he went and washed, and came back able to see.

His neighbors and those who had seen him earlier as a beggar said, "Isn't this the one who used to sit and beg?"

Some said, "It is, " but others said, "No, he just looks like him."

He said. "I am."

So they said to him, "How were your eyes opened?"

He replied, "The man called Jesus made clay and anointed my eyes and told me, 'Go to Siloam and wash'

So I went there and washed and was able to see." And they said to him, "Where is he?"

He said, "I don't know."

They brought the one who was once blind to the Pharisees.

Now Jesus had made clay and opened his eyes on a sabbath.

So then the Pharisees also asked him how he was able to see.

He said to them, "He put clay on my eyes, and I washed, and now I can see."

So some of the Pharisees said, "This man is not from God, because he does not keep the sabbath."

But others said, "How can a sinful man do such signs?"

And there was a division among them.

So they said to the blind man again, "What do you have to say about him, since he opened your eves?"

He said, "He is a prophet."

Now the Jews did not believe that he had been blind and gained his sight until they summoned

the parents of the one who had gained his sight. They asked them, "Is this your son, who you say was born blind?

How does he now see?"

His parents answered and said, "We know that this is our son and that he was born blind. We do not know how he sees now, nor do we

know who opened his eyes.

Ask him, he is of age; he can speak for himself." His parents said this because they were afraid of the Jews, for the Jews had already agreed that if anyone acknowledged him as the Christ, he would be expelled from the synagogue.

For this reason his parents said, "He is of age; question him."

So a second time they called the man who had been blind and said to him, "Give God the praise! We know that this man is a sinner."

He replied, "If he is a sinner, I do not know. One thing I do know is that I was blind and now I see."

So they said to him, "What did he do to you? How did he open your eyes?"

He answered them, "I told you already and you did not listen.

Why do you want to hear it again?

Do you want to become his disciples, too?" They ridiculed him and said, "You are that man's disciple; we are disciples of Moses!

We know that God spoke to Moses, but we do not know where this one is from."

The man answered and said to them, "This is what is so amazing, that you do not know where he is from, yet he opened my eyes.

We know that God does not listen to sinners, but if one is devout and does his will, he listens to him.

It is unheard of that anyone ever opened the eyes of a person born blind.

If this man were not from God, he would not be able to do anything."

They answered and said to him, "You were born totally in sin, and are you trying to teach us?" Then they threw him out.

When Jesus heard that they had thrown him out, he found him and said, "Do you believe in the Son of Man?"

He answered and said, "Who is he, sir, that I may believe in him?"

Jesus said to him, "You have seen him, the one speaking with you is he."

He said, "I do believe, Lord," and he worshiped him.

Then Jesus said, "I came into this world for judgment, so that those who do not see might see, and those who do see might become blind."

Some of the Pharisees who were with him heard this and said to him, "Surely we are not also blind, are we?"

Jesus said to them, "If you were blind, you would have no sin; but now you are saying, 'We see,' so your sin remains.

Guide for Holy Family and St. Mark during the current crisis:

We received a directive from our Bishop that as of Wednesday, March 18, there will be no public Masses within the Diocese of Lansing. At this point, the current situation will last until Wednesday of Holy Week.

Please read this announcement in its entirety and share this information with everyone within our parish boundaries.

Mass:

We will livestream a Mass at 8 am on Monday through Saturday.

We will livestream a Mass on Sundays at 10:00 am.

After the Masses, we will continue our livestream feed in order to allow you to hear from your priests who will offer some encouragement, inspiration, prayers and maybe even answer your questions.



All livestreamed Masses will be on the Church of the Holy Family Facebook page and our website (hfgb.org). All Mass intentions not covered during the Masses you see livestreamed will be prayed by Fr. Peter or me in private Masses in our chapel.

When we can pray at our Church:

Every day from 9 am until 4 pm, the Church (Hall) will be open for those who wish to sit in the worship space and pray. We will, obviously, need to limit the number of people allowed in to pray at the same time. Please be conscious of this. Also, please stay home if you are in a high risk demographic or if you are feeling sick.

Funerals:

Should the need for a funeral arise, we will offer two options. We will offer these as long as we can.

Option 1: The priests here pray a memorial Mass in their private chapel.

Option 2: The priest here pray a funeral Mass with only immediate family, not numbering over 10.

Weddings:

If you have a wedding scheduled during this time, we will work with you to do a private ceremony with the couple, the priest or deacon and two witnesses. We will offer this for as long as we are allowed.

Baptisms

Should a need for an emergency baptism arise, you are allowed to do the following: get water, and pour it three times on the child's head and say the following, using your child's name: "(Child's full name), I baptize you in the

name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit." If it is not an emergency baptism, please wait until the crisis passes.

What if someone is dying?

Please use our parish emergency number (810) 356-3187. One of us will get to you if it is possible. *Please, do not use the parish emergency number for anything except the danger of death.*

Holy Water:

We have blessed and exorcized an extraordinary amount of Holy Water and Salt for anyone who wishes. We have small bottles available for you to take the Holy Water and Salt home, but you may wish to bring your own container.

Eucharistic Procession

Fr. Peter and/or I will be processing through various neighborhoods in Grand Blanc with the Eucharist this Sunday. If this turns out to work, we will do it each Sunday until the crisis passes.

Should you see us and want a blessing, please come out on your porch or front lawn and we will stop and bless your house from the street or sidewalk. While we cannot offer you the reception of the Eucharist, we will be able to bless you with it.

As much as it pains me to type this, please do not attempt to join in the procession.

Should you need Holy Water while we are passing by, please let us know and we will try to leave you some. If possible, we will let you know where we are with the Eucharist on our *Church of the Holy Family Facebook page*.

Family, I have to tell you that we will need your financial support wherever possible during this time. While we will not have collections for a while, we have the same bills and an increasing number of people who need our help. Please, if you are in a position to do so, help us serve you and the most vulnerable among us by donating either online or sending donations in.

Please keep your eyes on our Church of the Holy Family Facebook page or website. We will try to update them faithfully so you know where we are and what we are doing.

May Jesus bless us with love, selflessness and patient endurance during this time.

Lenten Opportunities during a Difficult Time

We now have the opportunity while in this difficult and uncertain time to enter more deeply into the Lenten season. When we first started Lent on Ash Wednesday I hadn't realized how truly we would be called to enter the desert with Christ! It is especially now, when things are scary and unsure that we need to cling to Jesus. Some ways we can do that are:

- Making spiritual communions
- Praying the rosary as a family
- · Reading the daily scriptures out loud
- Watching a Lenten reflection video or movie on Formed.org
- Praying the stations of the cross

The one that I would like to highlight in particular is making a spiritual communion. What does this mean? A spiritual communion is a prayer you can make to ask Jesus to come into your heart spiritually like He does when you receive communion physically. It can be made any time one cannot receive communion, whether that is because of mortal sin or because you're in a situation like ours when public Masses are not happening. Jesus desires to be close to you even though you won't physically have Him!

Here is a very simple prayer you can pray for spiritual communion:

My Jesus, I believe that You are present in the Most Holy Sacrament. I love you above all things, and I desire to receive You into my soul. Since I cannot at this moment receive you sacramentally, come at least into my heart. I embrace You as if You were already there and unite myself wholly to You. Never permit me to be separated from You. Amen.

We encourage everyone to take this opportunity to trust more in the Lord and offer all our worries to Him. If you watch Mass through our live streams, the prayer for spiritual communion is perfect for when communion is being distributed.

We at Holy Family are praying for you all and hope you find comfort in this time.

The Rosary Makers Guild of Holy Family invites you to join them in praying the rosary, asking for Our Lady's intercession to help us come against the power of Satan (or Evils) to eradicate the Corona virus. Here is how it works. Beginning **Thursday, March 26th**, at 12:00 Noon, our rosary guild will be praying a rosary, **each from their homes**, but at that time and we invite you to join us. Let us call upon the intercession of St. Roch, 1295-1327. He was blessed to be born with a red cross on his chest. He was the only son of a wealthy governor in France. When he was 20 he left home and sailed on a ship to Italy. He gave away all his money in Italy and devoted his life to the plague-stricken, curing them with the Sign of the Cross. He was badly beaten and went into the woods to die. Dogs found him and licked his wounds and healed St. Roch (he is also known as the patron saint of dogs). He returned to France and was thrown into prison where he died and was known for his numerous miracles which attested to his sanctity.
